## Building Community

*Its almost a year since the Conference: that time of connection, face-to-face sharing of ideas and swapping notes with like-minded people. A time of affirmation that teaching and practising NFP is not for those who've run off with the fairies. Then the plummet to reality: the flight back home to where nothing has really changed. Its a little like returning to the wilderness. And now another year to wait until the next Conference.*

### Isolation

SO in time and space, members are isolated from each other. Further, the NFP community could be so much bigger were it not for the dissent amongst proponents of differing methods. Then, secular society capitalises on the burgeoning health-conscious market by offering "Natural Fertility" awareness, management, control, whatever. This dilutes the true NFP philosophy as the subtle focus is exclusively on fertility not on "family", which so perfectly merges fertility and sexuality. Consequently, teaching true NFP becomes increasingly marginalised. In the face of these isolating forces, what can be done?

### Building on current strengths

IN less than two years, the ACNFP community will have existed for thirty years. The **foundations** laid by the ACNFP pioneers are their point of future growth. To illustrate, NFP centres have in common ACNFP teaching manuals, policy & standard documents, and client materials. One often overlooked foundation is the ACNFP **logo**. Imagine the power of association that could be generated in the public mind if every NFP centre sported the ACNFP logo on their letterheads and business cards.

Today, there is more that helps

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define the ACNFP community. The advent of the **website** marks a point of consolidation in ACNFP's history: every affiliated centre is publicly listed with their own page and virtual e-mail address (such as [sydney@acnfp.com.au](mailto:sydney@acnfp.com.au), [brisbane.mater@acnfp.com.au](mailto:brisbane.mater@acnfp.com.au), etc.) By consistently referring every client, midwife, doctor, priest ... to the website, a clear message of affiliation to an authoritative national body is given rather than to a fringe group who happened to read a book, do a couple of courses and now think they can teach NFP. An opportunity exists for each NFP centre to participate in a nationwide cohesive marketing strategy grounded in the foundations of ACNFP that ensures the wider community is aware that ACNFP teachers are stringently trained and require two-yearly reaccreditation.

### Looking forward to community on-line

BY each NFP centre committing to the website, the promise of community outside of Conferences can be realised. There exists the opportunity for a "virtual" ACNFP community on-line through the website. The Webmaster has given a few suggestions for your consideration in this same issue.

## A Word from the Webmaster

THE [www.acnfp.com.au](http://www.acnfp.com.au) website informs the public about the symptothermal method and promotes the services that ACNFP affiliated services offer. A distinction is made between the two main service categories, namely clinical services (NFP teachers) and community programs (FLE teachers). Visitors are offered three ways of contacting an ACNFP affiliated centre: (1) the Tollfree number, (2) a lookup facility to find the contact details of their local centre and (3) an e-mail form that is routed to the e-mail address of their preferred centre (if an e-mail address has not been set up, it goes to the main centre). The first two options are conventional ways of making contact, while the third offers Internet style communication. The prospective client is given the choice.

The website was registered with search engines in July 2003 and first promoted in the Winter 2003 *The Natural News* and also in a letter from the president that accompanied the recent membership receipt. The statistics show 140 visitors to the site in August 2003, which is encouraging.

The two service contact forms have been used for a handful of test submissions from members. The general contact form has allowed the public to contact us. As the website receives more publicity, this usage should increase.

## President's Report

# Erroneous Comments Cause Disquiet

On the weekend of 12th-13 July 2003 the *Sydney Morning Herald* carried a report from the Reuters news service which was headlined "Science Spotlights Flaw in Rhythm Method". It was claimed that scientists in Canada found that women "sometimes ovulate several times in a single month." These findings would "help explain why natural methods of birth control... often fail". Then the same message was given in the *Sydney Morning Herald* 24th July 2003 under an even bigger headline.. "Getting the Ovary So Very Wrong", this time quoting the Los Angeles Times concerning the same article.

I was naturally incredulous and when the source was identified as the July issue of "*Fertility and Sterility*" I downloaded the original article (July 2003 pages 116-122). This was entitled "A New Model for Ovarian Follicular Development During the Human Menstrual Cycle", written by Angela Baerwald, Gregg Adams and Roger Pierson, from the University of Saskatchewan, Canada.

The report described changes in ovarian follicle dynamics during the menstrual cycle by daily transvaginal ultrasonography. The authors identified 2 and sometimes 3 waves of follicular development in a cycle, but only 1 such wave per cycle resulted in ovulation, the others clearly anovular.

I had submitted a letter (attachment A) to the editor of the *Sydney Morning Herald* on 24th July but it was not published. I then sent an e-mail to the first author of the quoted article, saying that the authors were being seriously misquoted in the world's press and asking for comment. I got a reply 11 days later (attachment B, see page 6) and my objection to the press reports was vindicated. The first paragraph of the author's reply is quite decisive.

This whole episode shows how scientific data can be misquoted and the cause of NFP denigrated. Clearly, we must have recourse to the original sources to check whether criticism is warranted. Unfortunately, a press retraction has not been forthcoming.

I trust teachers and their clients have not been unsettled by this false reporting.

Sir,

The brief report from Reuters (SMH. Weekend 12-13 July) about a recent article in "*Fertility and Sterility*" was factually incorrect and your headline "Science Spotlights Flaw in Rhythm Method" was quite unwarranted. Contrary to your report the original study clearly states that 13 of the study group of 63 women did not have multiple ovulations but a variety of "ovarian irregularities". The other 50 women with regular cycles were indeed found to have 2 or 3 "waves" of follicular development but only 1 such "wave" per cycle beginning in the early follicular phase culminated in ovulation. The other "waves" consisted of generally smaller follicles which the authors clearly stated were anovulatory (being inhibited by luteal phase progesterone).

The article provides no hormonal data nor any attempt to correlate follicular development with the physical signs of fertility or infertility.

The authors simply documented by ultrasonography some generally unrecognised structural changes in the ovaries during the course of a cycle. Contrary to your headline, the article in *Fertility and Sterility* in no way undermines the scientific basis of Natural Family Planning.

## A Precis of the Paper (*Fertility and Sterility*, 80, 116, 2003)

THE researchers studied the menstrual cycles of 50 Canadian women from one ovulation to the next, rather than from one menstruation to the next. By means of daily ultrasonography of the ovaries of these women, it was found that 68% of the women had two waves and 32% had three waves of follicular development judged on numbers and size of follicles above 5mm in diameter in the interval between one ovulation and the next. This finding therefore challenges the belief that only one cohort of follicles develops in the human menstrual cycle, namely, the particular follicular development stimulated by rising blood levels of the follicle stimulating hormone (FSH) from the pituitary gland just prior to menstruation. One of the cohort becomes the dominant follicle that will proceed to ovulation, the timing of which is linked with a surge of luteinising hormone (LH) from the pituitary gland.

The study found that the first wave of follicular growth in women in the two wave group appeared early in the post-ovulatory luteal phase of the cycle and the second wave in the post-menstrual pre-ovulatory phase. Women in the three wave group had two waves in the luteal phase, the second wave occurring late in that phase, and the third wave in the post-menstrual preovulatory phase. Generally, the follicles developing in the luteal phase of both groups of women were found to be smaller than those in the preovulatory phase.

A significant finding was that follicular development in the luteal phase of the cycle did not culminate in ovulation. Ovulation occurred at the end of the final wave of development in the post-menstrual pre-ovulatory phase. The authors postulate that the reason for anovular follicular development in the luteal phase is due to the inhibitory effect of progesterone (the dominating hormone throughout this phase) on luteinising hormone secretion (LH) from the pituitary gland. Ovulation requires a surge of LH. Thus this study supports the established scientific fact that ovulation only occurs at one time in the cycle, at the end of the pre-ovulatory (follicular) phase.

## Comment

THE study of Baerwald et alia in no way undermines the scientific basis of modern natural family planning methods, relying as they do on the recognition by women of the bodily signs and symptoms associated with ovulation and its aftermath.

Thank you very much for your comments on our recent publication, as well as some of the information released by the press.

Both Dr. Pierson and I completely agree with you that the information released in the Reuters report was inaccurate. As you have read, we documented 2 and 3 waves of ovarian follicular development during the menstrual cycle, of which only the final wave was ovulatory.

I have been away on maternity leave the past 4 weeks, but Dr. Pierson has assured me that he has spoken with the press at length, including Reuters, to verify our findings. It was unfortunate that this information was released to the public, because it was very misleading.

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# Reasons for the use of Natural Family Planning

*This article gives a picture of why people choose natural family planning (NFP). It is based on reasons given by clients attending NFP Centres throughout Australia.*

Many people choose NFP because they hold the conviction that man and woman were created as companions for each other and part of the function of intimate loving between man and woman is to create and care for new life. The ultimate expression of a couple's love and life together is sexual intercourse. This act involves their total person (mind, heart, body and soul) in a free and complete giving of one to the other. It is potentially creative not only in the sense that for a committed couple it enhances, deepens and enriches their relationship, but in that it can also create new life. Many people choose NFP because of the conviction that to deprive sexual intercourse of either end is not consonant with nature.

A responsible couple aware of the life-giving potential of sexual intercourse will set about coping with their fertility when the time comes to space or limit family size. The decision about family planning rightly rests with each individual couple. The committed loving couple will mutually choose a method of fertility control that is acceptable to them both.

NFP offers couples an effective means of fertility control that frees them from a dependence on artificial methods which they may find unacceptable. It teaches couples an understanding of the functions of their reproductive systems. In the case of the woman, it teaches her to recognize the physical signs and symptoms which identify the fertile and infertile phases of her menstrual cycle. The couple can use their knowledge of their combined fertility to achieve or avoid pregnancy by undertaking intercourse or abstaining during the fertile phase of the woman's cycle.

NFP means that a couple's fertility is not hidden under the cover of the pill or other device. It is an open, accepted and understood part of each partner's total being and of their life together as a couple. An understanding of the biological processes of fertility generally creates an admiration of the couple's creative potential, an appreciation and respect for manhood and womanhood, and a gratitude towards the Creator who has made man and woman to so beautifully complement each other in a loving commitment which is open to personal fulfillment and the creation of new life.

Because natural family planners live

constantly with the implications of their fertility rather than eliminating it temporarily or permanently, their fertility and their whole sexual relationship is an open and recurring question between them. In learning to cope with periodic abstinence, they need to share their personal feelings, hopes and frustrations with each other. This mutual sharing can lead to a deeper understanding of each other as individual persons. It leads to the acceptance of the other as a total and unique person whose fertility is not seen as a threat or an encumbrance to the strengthening and enrichment of their relationship but as a positive asset of sexuality, a couple's mutual gift and shared responsibility. Their fertility is seen as a power that they possess and can be controlled according to their mutual decision at any given time.

NFP appeals to many people today who are rejecting the artificiality of this highly technical age and who seek a lifestyle which is in harmony with nature. They reject the use of drugs for non-medical purposes and prefer a method of birth control that respects the laws of nature. They see the value of a method that is free of the potentially damaging elements which they perceive to be present in some artificial means of birth prevention.


Many couples believe they can manage their own fertility without resort to technology. They reason that fertility is a nor-

mal health state and it is quite within their power to find a solution to what is a personal "non-medical" human condition. Many couples see natural birth control as aesthetically acceptable in that it eliminates the need to use mechanical devices (diaphragm, spermicides, condom, etc.) which disrupt the naturalness and spontaneity of sexual intercourse.

As outlined in this article, couples are attracted to natural family planning for a variety of reasons. Quite often the decision for natural family planning is based purely on the need they feel at the time to space or limit their family size. With most, there is little realisation of the benefits they will ultimately gain from their decision. In time, the committed and mutually caring couples see natural family planning not simply as a means of limiting family size but a rewarding way to live the married life. A true marriage is a union of heart, mind and body in total mutual acceptance, a personal love-commitment which may be communicated in non-genital ways. Periodic abstinence requires creative self-discipline which challenges couples to use the other ways they have of demonstrating tenderness, concern and regard. Natural family planning invites couples to find in these encounters the way to personal enrichment and rewarding marriage.

They are easy to remember! This gives the organisation a uniform Internet presence and it promotes a sense of community. When e-mail is sent to these addresses it merely forwards to a physical e-mail address that is set up. This could be any valid e-mail address. Another benefit is that the virtual address can be maintained as just the physical address needs to be substituted. No need to advise everyone that you have changed your e-mail address! If your centre does not yet have a virtual e-mail address, then please contact me.

This website has created an Internet presence for each ACNFP affiliated centre in that contact details are now available in a web page. This information is stored in a database and accessed via a look-up facility. Thank you to those centres that have advised me of updates — we must keep these details current!

require further content. The vision for *The Natural News* section is that it can be used to offer a reference to past articles. The Web Store can be used to market the stock that is maintained by the administration officer.
